

Undergraduate Academic Warning and Dismissal Policies

Per University Handbook, F100-103

Academic Dismissal – all students

Students who neglect their academic responsibilities are at risk of being dismissed. Once dismissed, a student will no longer be able to be enrolled in coursework and cannot complete their degree. Students must wait two semesters (excluding summer term) before petitioning for reinstatement to the university.

Academic Warning – all students

Students will be placed on academic warning if they earn <2.00 for **either** their semester GPA **or** their cumulative GPA. Students are automatically taken off academic warning when their semester GPA **and** cumulative GPA are 2.000 or higher. **Note:** Summer and intersession course work does not change a student's warning status.

Academic Registration Hold (ARH) – continuing students

Students earning <1.000 semester GPA will be placed on Academic Registration Hold (ARH). The ARH will prevent students from adding or dropping courses. To remove the ARH, the student must meet with their advisor to develop a plan to improve their performance and complete the <u>Petition for Removal of ARH</u>.

Dismissal Criteria - first semester freshman or transfer students

Any student earning <1.000 GPA their first semester will be dismissed (no warning).

<u>Dismissal Criteria - continuing students</u>

1. Continuing students will be dismissed:

- If on academic warning the previous semester, and
- The following semester, their cumulative GPA does not meet the appropriate threshold level on the Dismissal GPA Threshold Chart.

2. Continuing students will not be dismissed:

- If they have completed <20 total hours*, or
- If their K-State semester GPA was 2.200 or higher, for at least 12 graded hours, in their last completed semester.
